


Plan developed by the Virginia Coastal Zone Management Program and Clean Virginia Waterways



Marine debris is defined as any persistent solid material that is manufactured or processed and directly or indirectly, intentionally or unintentionally, disposed of or abandoned into the marine environment or the Great Lakes.

Land-based Sources 60% to 80%












Water-based Sources





This chart shows plastic <u>waste</u>. Production of plastic is approximately 20% higher. Mostly single-use disposables.

- 4.8 million pounds of litter and debris over the years
- Data collected








Top 20 Items recorded by volunteers Virginia Waterways Cleanup Yellow = Plastic

Orange = Mostly plastic



State Policies Enacted

- Litter Tax —raised after 44 years from \$10 to \$20
- Intentional balloon releases -- illegal in VA as of July 1, 2021
- Polystyrene food containers phase out
- Plastic bags Local governments enabled to add 5-cent fee on plastic bags
- Plastic Waste Prevention Advisory Council





Executive Order #77 Governor Northam (March 23, 2021)

Immediate Cessation:

- Disposable plastic bags
- Single-use plastic and polystyrene food service containers
- Plastic straws and cutlery
- Single-use plastic water bottles

Planned Phase-Out

- All non-medical single-use plastics
- 25% by 12/31; 100% by 2025

To keep Virginia's coasts, communities, habitats, wildlife, and our ocean free from marine debris.



Opportunities for State Policy Action

- Statewide bottle bill
- Extended producer responsibility laws
- Implement recommendations of the Plastic Waste Prevention Advisory Council

Opportunities for Local Policy Action

- Support local policymakers to implement single-use plastic bag fees
- Track plastic bag fee implementation and determine success
- Local ordinances regarding dumpster management and hauling
- Local ordinances on bulk trash disposal options

Derelict Fishing Gear

Opportunities for State Policy Action

 Statewide policy for the collection and recycling of monofilament and fluorocarbon fishing lines

Research Need

- Database of existing laws and regulations for derelict fishing gear
- Bycatch reduction
- Alternative materials for clam netting

Microplastics & Microfibers

- Increased public education and outreach
- Data sharing and best practices
- Focus on continued research
- Prepare for policy action



Abandoned & Derelict Vessels

- Growing problem
- Workgroup established
- Educational campaign developing
- Inventory beginning
