2018-2020 Chesapeake Bay Action Plan

Details NRCS commitments to priorities/goals for Natural Resources, Outreach, and Engagement. NRCS exceeded all its 2018 goals, achieving:

- 3,627 new conservation professionals trained
- 12,106 public and private partners/citizens engaged in public meetings and committees
- 28,020 new, underserved, and priority customers reached
- 404,008 acres with practices implemented to improve water quality
- 268,348 acres to improve soil health
- 41,552 acres to restore/improve fish & wildlife habitat

NRCS Natural Resource Priorities

- Improve water quality

NRCS Science, Technology and Partnership Priorities

- Science, Technology and Data Guides Watershed and Farm Planning
- Use Partnerships to Increase Capacity and Effectiveness to Improve Natural resources
- Planning with Customers, Not for Customers

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2018 Farm Bill - NRCS invests an average of \$8 million per day into conservation systems

NRCS has worked with producers to invest over \$1.1 billion into the Chesapeake Bay Watershed.

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2018 Farm Bill and NRCS Conservation Programs

- Demonstrates strong congressional support
- Helps streamline, target and simplify NRCS programs
- No new NRCS programs were added; none eliminated
- RCPP changed as a standalone program
- Developing rules that will be ready for FY20 signups
- NRCS will continue to offer the programs and assistance that producers and partners have come to expect

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Changes to EQIP

- Adds resource concerns
- Raises cap for organic producers to \$140,000
- New enrollment option to address
 resource concerns
- Advance payments for historically underserved producers



- Expands CAPs to include soil health planning
- Increases authorization to >\$2 billion by 2023

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Changes to CSP



- Increases payment rates for certain activities
- Authorizes contract extensions
- Provides specific support for organic
- Includes special grassland conservation initiative



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Changes to ACEP



- Assistance for 'Buy-Protect-Sell' transactions
- New requirements for highly erodible land
- Increases flexibility for partners
- Adds water quality as resource concern
- Expands wetland eligibility



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Changes to RCPP

- Announced Sept. 3, NRCS is accepting proposals with a Dec. 3 deadline.
- Now a stand alone program with its own funding - \$300 M/year nationwide.
- Enhanced Alternative Funding Arrangement provision – Farm Bill established 15 "alternate funding arrangements" or grants
- Three funding pools reduced to two — National pool eliminated
- Emphasis on project outcomes





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CIG update 0 0 0 0 0 0 0 0

- NEW! On-Farm trial awards (\$25 M) planned announcement in November
- December Regular CIG awards (\$12.5 M) planned to be announced
- FY19 CIG proposal period has closed
- Proposals are in peer review



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Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program-CREP

Targets high-priority conservation concerns identified by a State. Federal funds are supplemented with non-federal funds to address those concerns.



Resource Concern Priorities: Water Quality

NRCS will continue to address water quality concerns through EQIP, CSP and RCPP.

- This Conservation Title also requires collaboration with community water systems and state technical committees. A minimum level of 10 percent of conservation program funding, other than CRP, is to
- be used for *source water protection*.
- Water quality and water quantity practices that protect source water may have increased payment rates (not to exceed 90%).



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Source Water Protection



- Should be considered in all programs; at least 10% of funding (except CREP) so approximately \$320 to \$377 million annually will be available nationwide.
- Certain entities (e.g., states, irrigation districts and groundwater mgmt. districts) are now eligible for water conservation and system efficiency practices.
- Increased payment rates (not to exceed 90%) for water quality and quantity practices that protect source water.



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Information Gathering and Data Sharing O O O

- The law has not changed!
- 2008 Farm Bill, Section 1619
- NRCS continues to share 100% of its practice data in aggregated form through partnership with USGS.
- Under 1619, we must aggregate the data to protect landowner privacy.
